• Study patterns are reversed from our day

Principal Kaine Osburn said students are now required to buy a netbook computer which they bring to school and use at home. There is financial aid for those students who can't afford a netbook. The pattern now is that they study the new lesson for each class on the cloud at night, then do practice exercises in class on what they learned the previous night. Teachers are much more effective this way and students learn the material much better. Students are allowed to bring laptops, cellphones, netbooks and mobile internet devices to school, with use in the classroom at the discretion of the teachers. • Student population changes

About 60% of the students don't speak English in their homes. About 35 different languages are spoken. The largest ethnic group is Asian at over 33%. http://www.zipdatamaps.com/60077

• Do mainly less wealthy families go to Niles?

No. The main reason parents choose to move to Skokie and the towns around it are so that their kids can go to Niles West and North for the excellent education.

Daycare is offered on the campus

Teachers can drop off their young children at a well equipped daycare at Niles West. There is a small playground outside for toddlers in a grassy pocket park between the building walls. There is limited space, so this service is not offered to students' children.

• The arts

Niles West's arts program was voted #1 in the nation a few years ago.

The gym

The gym looks great, with two tiers of bleachers now instead of one, to accommodate the larger school population. The bleachers fold back against the wall, as in our day. There are colorful posters and lots of foam mats. There's an indoor track building, plus a fitness center with weights and cardio rooms.

• Some areas didn't change

The swimming pool looks good and the same, but it was locked, so we could only see it from the door windows. It was built the summer before our senior year. The auditorium also looks the same. Except for computer stations, the library looks the same as well.

• The home economics kitchens and shop facilities

The kitchens and shop facilities were huge and very well equipped. There is drafting/CADD.

• There is a new academic wing of the building

To accommodate the expanding student population, they built a new wing on the building.

• The wolf mural

In the hall next to the auditorium there is now a nicely done mural showing wolves in a woods with a few shadowy Indians showing behind a few trees, to give homage to the name of the former school mascot name from our day.

• The Indians logo our class donated for the hallway floor is now gone

Because the school mascot changed, they removed the Indian logo that was embedded in the hallway floor that our senior class had given the school.

• What is the dress code?

Prohibited clothing is: sleeveless undershirts, lifter shirts, tube tops without a shirt over them, visible underwear, uncovered midriffs, and clothing with holes in inappropriate places. No bare feet or hats. He said the largest part of his day, almost daily, was dealing with "inappropriate dress" issues. A day never went by without him having to ask a student to pull their pants up over their tushies, or to put a shirt on, or take off clothing with cut-offs, or holes.

• Textbooks will be replaced by iPads

All the textbooks are eventually going to be on the IPADS, doing away with the books completely. However, any access to the internet's social networks would be blocked. In other words, the students would not be able to use the devices to log on to Facebook, or do other social things not related to their school work.
